2024 ACCOMPLISHMENTS

The Nature Foundation of Will County raises and administers funds to support the Forest Preserve District of Will County's priorities. The Foundation is committed to meeting the interests of its donors and supports programs and projects that protect nature, inspire discovery and bring people and nature together.



Legacy Gifts

The Nature Foundation received additional gifts for habitat restoration at Goodenow Grove Nature Preserve. Additionally, landowners to begued tha farm to The Nature Foundation

indicated their intent to bequeath a farm to The Nature Foundation.

Invest in Nature Corporate Partnerships

In 2024, The Nature Foundation of Will County secured over \$79,000 from corporations and foundations to support Forest Preserve District initiatives and The Foundation's native plant sale events.

- Funding for In-House Exhibit Construction at Four Rivers Environmental Education Center in partnership with Pembina Pipeline Corporation.
- Education and program supplies for Hidden Oaks Nature Center in partnership with The Sgt. Thomas M. Gilbert Memorial Foundation.
- Supplies and equipment for volunteer community workdays and the Adopt-A-Preserve program in partnership with Target Corp.
- Supplies, gifts and lunch for Teacher Appreciation Days at Four Rivers in partnership with ONEOK.
- New signs to install at Whalon Lake Preserve in partnership with Vulcan Materials Company Foundation.
- Acquisition of a fully restored and operational mid-1930's John Deere Tractor and wagon with a grant from Target Corporation.
- Support for native plant sale events and the Bringing Nature Home Initiative received from A.J Dralle, Inc., Brent Hassert Consulting LLC, Christopher B. Burke Engineering, Ltd., Davey Resource Group, Enbridge, JULIE Inc., KGG, LLC., Nicor Gas, Strand Associates, V3 Companies, Village of Romeoville.

Organizational Development

The Nature Foundation of Will County's ability to accomplish its mission and meet the interests of its donors relies on sound fundraising and investment strategies, a growing and diverse donor base, an engaged Board of Directors, developing and deepening relationships with donors and supporters, and a commitment to organizational development.

In 2024, the Foundation made progress on most of the areas below. The year brought a new part-time contracted executive director and the former executive director moved into a program coordinator role for the first 10 months of 2024.

As a way to create efficiencies in the Foundation's operations, a new customer relationship management database was implemented to reduce duplicative data entry, reduce credit card processing fees, eliminate multiple tools to reach donors and to lay the foundation for improved donor stewardship and cultivation.

Fundraising & Projects

- 1. There is a constant and diversified revenue income.
- 2. Donors are engaged and the donor base is growing.
- 3. Donors are incorporating TNF in financial planning.
- 4. The Foundation provides significant funding to the Forest Preserve District in support of its conservation, preservation, education and recreation priorities.

Finance & Investment

- 1. There is a constant and diversified revenue income.
- 2. The Foundation is able to invest and earn interest income.
- 3. The operating reserve ratio is 1.5 to 2.
- 4. The program expense ratio is 75%.
- 5. Meet or exceed a 10% to 15% profit margin.

Board Development

- 1. Board members represent Will County and have diverse experiences and interests.
- 2. Board members understand and fulfill their duties as directors, officers, committee chairs and committee members.
- 3. The Board Development committee quickly and easily fills board vacancies. 4. Board members feel supported and valued.

Volunteerism & Community Engagement

- 1. There is a collaborative relationship with Volunteer Services.
- 2. Volunteer experiences with the Foundation are positive.
- 3. Volunteers seek out Foundation assignments, programs and projects.
- 4. Foundation opportunities enhance the Forest Preserve's volunteer program.

- 1. The Foundation is modeling best practices in non-profit governance.
- 2. Daily administrative duties are well-managed.
- 3. Committees and work groups are motivated to accomplish their goals.
- 4. The Foundation is trusted and respected among its donors, supporters and peer organizations.
- 5. The Foundation has the capacity to serve in leadership roles.



2024 Highlights

Over the past 10 years, we've secured over \$1.85 Million in support of the Forest Preserve District of Will County's preservation, conservation, recreation and education priorities.

We worked alongside 100 volunteers who donated 780 hours of their time.

FOCUS AREAS FOR 2025

Organizational Development & Leadership

Throughout 2024, the newly contracted executive director benefitted from having the former executive director contracted to execute the native plant sales, the native plant garden tour, and the Learn and Grow seminars. The former executive director retired at the end of October.

Priorities for this transition year include clarifying The Nature Foundation's vision for the future, creating a plan of work that supports that vision, and prioritizing work that can be achieved with limited human resources.

To increase capacity, the Foundation will contract with a part time bookkeeper/administrative assistant in 2025.

Stewardship Development

Place a greater emphasis on stewardship efforts for all Foundation stakeholders including donors, corporate partners, volunteers, and board members.

Financial Development

Place increased emphasis on growing unrestricted gifts and funding the Foundation's mission while continuing to invest and grow assets, provided the climate is favorable.

Legacy Development

Complete development of the Legacy Society and Founder's Circle and continue to promote the benefits and impacts of legacy giving.

Invest in Nature Partnership Development

Continue to engage the business community in multiple ways and grow support for the Foundation and its initiatives as well as for Forest Preserve District programs and projects.

Board Member Development

Develop and implement an orientation, training and leadership development program for new and existing board members. Explore the possibility of holding hybrid board meetings.

Storytelling Development

Develop a storytelling approach in the Foundation's marketing and communications strategies that focuses on sharing donor impacts, celebrating achievements, highlighting important issues, and honoring its donors and partners.
